"Also, it helps prevent junk mail which people get with the more common e-mail addresses. City awarded Fairtrade status

The Fairtrade Foundation guarantees a fair price for farmers and producers in developing countries.

It seems only fitting that Kilkenny is the first city in Ireland to achieve Fairtrade status as the first ever Fairtrade Network meeting was held here in 1991. Since then, a number of people have been working towards



fulfilling the list of criteria necessary for Fairtrade status.

"We had to have a specified number of cafés, restaurants, shops and offices selling or serving Fairtrade products," said Audrey Mongan, Environmental Officer with Kilkenny County Council. "We had to have a steering committee in place and someone out speaking to schools."

Ms Mongan was one of the people responsible for bringing Fairtrade coffee and tea into both County and Borough Council offices.

The city first submitted an application to become Ireland's first Fairtrade City in 1991 and was followed quickly by Cork and Waterford.

"All three cities were declared Fairtrade Cities on the same day," said Ms Mongan, "but Kilkenny led the way."

At a celebration in Langton's Hotel to mark the achievement, Melanie Drea of Fairtrade Ireland confirmed that Kilkenny had been way ahead of the targets laid down by the foundation.

"Since the application was submitted, Kilkenny has 50% more shops and offices on board," said Ms Mongan.
